WORKSHOP ON USING THE RESOURCE CENTER February 19, 1991

Liz Coleman presented an excellent survey of those materials in the Resource Center which might be most useful as we begin research there.

- 1. Start with charts, forms, maps available at the Center.
- 2. Cemetery records: The Jones County WPA project of the 1930's is shelved at the Center. It is a good place to start on locating surnames in the county. (WPA census of cemeteries in Jackson and Linn Counties also shelved there.)
- 3. Indices to 1879 and 1910 Jones County histories. (The Anamosa Library has the books; must be used at the Library.)
- 4. 1840-1877 county marriage records, indexed in book form. (Also available for sale.)
- 5. Maps. Sectional atlas (townships) 1877, 1893.
- 6. How to Do Things, a FARM JOURNAL publication of 1919 contains many surnames.
- 7. Roster of Iowa soldiers in the Civil War. (Also, see the 1879 history in the Library.)
- 8. Pedigree charts from members. (Look for surnames.)
- 9. Society newsletters. (Also available for sale.)
- 10. Illustrated Historical Atlas of Iowa, 1875.
- 11. Centennial books from Martelle, Morley, Oxford Junction. Sesquicentennial books from Monticello and Anamosa.
- 12. Madison Center Cemetery records, census for area, family histories.

ARMSTRONG HISTORY

Alexander Armstrong and his wife, Janey, probably Jane Ambrose, of Scotland and Ireland, came to America possibly before 1790. Alexander died April 13, 1852. They were the parents of two children: John, born in 1870, and Janey who died in childhood. Some of the records place John's birthplace in Ireland; others in New York City. He

Ireland; others in New York City. He moved with his parents to Philadelphia. He was married to Harriet Hornbeck, March 25, 1831. They were the parents of seven children: Mary Jane (1831-1911), Catherine Maria (1832-1921), John Alexander (1834-1907), George Ambrose (1837-1907), James Hornbeck (1841-1906), Charles Ransom (1847-1919), Dewitt Clinton (1849-1922).

The entire Armstrong family with a niece, Harriet Doolittle, on May 10, 1852, started their westward trek from Marathon, N. Y.: by boat from Ithaca, N. Y.

thon, N. Y.: by boat from Ithaca, N. Y. to Buffalo, N. Y., then by steamer to Chicago. From Chicago they traveled by rail to Cherry Valley, Ill., terminal of the railroad, from where the trip to Fairview, Iowa, was made by team, crossing the Mississippi at Sabula, Iowa, June 1, 1852.

The first year in Iowa, they made their home in the basement of Dr. Matson's house that stood alongside the lane to the farm now occupied by Darrell Lerch. The family then bought the farm where Mayme Lerch now lives. The senior Mr. Armstrong was killed when struck by lightning July 7, 1862. Mrs. Armstrong died May 30, 1888.

James remained with his mother for six years, and then on Feb. 19, 1868, was married to Ann Eliza Brady. They started housekeeping on a site owned by Joe Brown Jr. opposite the Norwich cemetery, after which they purchased a farm northeast of Martelle. They were the parents of seven children: Jennie May, Jan. 29, 1869; John Sylvestus, Dec. May, Jan. 25, 1005, John Sylvestus, 25, 2, 1870; Eugene Dever, June 17, 1873; Mary Eleanor, Nov. 23, 1875; Anna Evelyn, June 14, 1882; James, May 5, 1884; Cora Gail, Sept. 29, 1889.

Jennie Mae was married to Herbin Siden McConaughy, Sept. 28, 1892. They had no children. Mrs. McConaughy died

Nov. 16, 1961.

John Sylvestus was married on Dec.
10, 1895 to Mae Eliza Pollard. They had six children: Fanny Lorene, Leslie Clair, Gerald James, Geraldine Ann, Doris Essalee, and Mae Eliza.

Fanny Lorene, Mrs. Guy Martin, no children. Leslie Clair, married to Lora, Newman, two children: Zella, Mrs. James Miller, and Winona, Mrs. Ralph Bowers. Gerald James, married to Ruth Newman, three children: Faye, Mrs. Marion Davis; K, Mrs. Paul Wentzein; Avis (dec'd), Mrs. Donald Martin. Geraldine Ann (dec'd), Mrs. Lawrence Davis, second husband, Elmer Arner (dec'd), no children. Doris Essalee, Mrs. Glenn Strother, four children: Dale, married to Esther Thomas; Louis, married to Helen Bader (dec'd); Richard, married to Donna Lea Heiken; Lois Darlene, Mrs. John Davis Jr., Mae Eliza, Mrs. Arthur Siver; three children: La-Verta, Mrs. Louis Langenberg; Annetta; Mrs. Kenneth Dinger; Thomas, married to Nola Townsend.

Mae Eliza, John Sylvestus' first wife, died June 3, 1910. He was married a second time, Feb. 11, 1914, to Flora Sackrider, who died Jan. 18, 1955. John

preceded her death, April 30, 1955.

Eugene Dever was married to Lucy Robbins, Dec. 22, 1897. They had no children. Lucy died Dec. 14, 1957, and Eugene died Jan. 26, 1965.

Mary Lieanor was married to Claude Peet, Feb. 14, 1900; one daughter, Leone Merle, born April 17, 1902, died Aug. 16, 1962. Claude died Feb. 21, 1952, and Mary died June 9, 1968.

Anna Evelyn was married on Nov. 25, 1908, to Charles Henry Brown, who died June 19, 1929. She then married Ray Airgood on Sept. 7, 1949. He died March 21, 1962, and Anna died March

James Carl was married on June 9, 1904, to Edith Maude Boxwell, who died June 3, 1943. They were the parents of three children: Melvin Ray, Lynn Carl, and Gayle Cora, all of whom reside in Montana.

JOHN BAIRD

John and Helen (Donald) Baird were both born in Ayrshire, Scotland; John in 1824 and Helen in 1832. They embarked for America on their wedding day in 1851, first settling in Oneida county, N. Y.; in 1855 moved to Davenport, Iowa, then to Greenfield township, Jones county, Iowa, in 1859.

Five children grew to adulthood: Jane, Mrs. William Ellison; Agnes; Mary Ann, Mrs. Omer Cole; Katie, Mrs. Harry Peet, and Andrew James. John Baird served as justice of the peace, assessor, school treasurer, and director. The Bairds retired to Lisbon where they celebrated their 65th anniversary in 1916.

Andrew Baird was married to Myrtle

Andrew Baird was married to Myrtle Sandefur in 1900. They were the parents of three children: Clarice (dec'd); John L., Asbury, N. J.; Helen, Mrs. Herman Schmidt. Mr. and Mrs. Herman Schmidt reside on the homestead. They are the parents of two sons: Gerald John and James Baird. Gerald John is married to Wava Palmer; four children: Janice, John, Andrew, and Carrie; reside in Newtown, Conn. James Baird is married to Susan Peet; three children: Amy, Debra, and Eric James; operate farm south of Martelle.

JOHN E. BARNER

John E. Barner, one of five children, was born to Samuel and Louise Barner, Oct. 4, 1862, at Orangeville, Ill. When he was 20 years old, he came with his parents to Iowa, settling on a farm near Morley.

He was united in marriage, Jan. 25, 1888, to Wealthy Jane Drips, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Drips, pioneer residents in the Linn Grove community. Immediately after their marriage, they established their home on a farm near Martelle, where they remained until their retirement.

Mr. Barner, in his youth, was a member of Company C of the Old State militia. Coincidentally, his son served in World War I with this same

reorganized company.

Mr. Barner was a member of the Martelle Knights of Pythias lodge and the Masonic lodge at Mount Vernon. He was a charter director of the Martelle Washington of the Washington telle Farmers Savings bank, and was president of the board for several years.

Mr. and Mrs. Barner were the parents of two children: George Samuel, born Jan. 30, 1890; and Mary Agnes, born May 10, 1894, now a resident of Nevada.

George Samuel was married to Gladys George Samuel was married to Glauys Leinbaugh. They were the parents of Creighton and Steven. George served on the board of the Farmers Savings bank, a director and president of the Martelle elevator, and a member of the Martelle Knights of Pythias lodge, and

of the American Legion and Mailodge at Mount Vernon.

Mr. and Mrs. Barner resided on the farm until the death of Mr. Barner of April 21, 1952. Their son, Creighton moved to the farm when Mrs. Barn retired to Martelle.

GEORGE BEIGHLE, SENIOR

Mr. and Mrs. George Beighle Sr. came to Martelle in 1889, residing for one year in the Peet place, presently home of the Ellis Lambertsens. They moved to Martelle, where they had built a house near the depot, where Carl Nissen now (1971) resides.

They were the parents of five children: Gladys and Joseph (both dec'd), Laura, Ethel, and George Jr.

Laura was married to Bert DeWolf; two children: Donald (dec'd), and Betty

who was married to Frank Crilly.

Ethel was married to John Bauer. They had one daughter, Clara, who died in 1928. After the death of her first husband, she was married to Charles Kuntz and moved to a farm southeast of Martelle.

George Jr., married to Lydia Kautz; one son, Lyall, who was married to Helen Griffin in 1938; two children: Raymond G., Aug. 14, 1940; and Patricia, Feb. 7, 1947. Raymond was married to Kay Ellen Anderson on June 16. 1963; two children: Jonathan Jay, July 4, 1964; and James Devin, Nov. 3, 1965. Patricia was married to Richard Jongewaard on June 13, 1969.

BOBST FAMILY

Phillip and Anna Onstott Bobst, fro Pike county, Ohio, moved to Iowa 1890, locating on the Hubbell farms south of Martelle until 1912. They were the parents of nine children, four of whom came with them from Ohio: Clyde Onstott, Lee, Andrew, and Albert. Mrs. Bobst died in 1909. Phillip moved in 1912 to a farm south

of Marion until 1934, when he returned to Martelle, residing there until his death in 1959. Brief sketches of the Bobst children follow:

Clyde Onstott remained in Martelle for several years, then moved to Wyoming, lowa. He was married to Wyo-ming, lowa. He was married to Kathryn Brutzman and had one daughter, Mil-dred. All are deceased. Lee Bobst always was a Martelle resident. He was engaged in several business ventures, including restaurant, iewelry, and hardware. He was married

jewelry, and hardware. He was married to Hazel Waln, who is still living and resides in the original home on main street. They had no children.

Andrew Bobst moved from Martelle to the Mount Vernon area, where he operated a painting and decorating business. He was married to Hazel Border. Both are deceased. They had no children.

Charles Bobst was married to Sylvia Joslin and moved to the Joslin farm near Anamosa. They had two children, Lolin and Glatha. Charles died in 1970. His widow still lives on the farm.

William Bobst, married to Goldie Ilgenfritz, farmed near Springville, then moved to Cedar Rapids, where he war associated with the implement business They were the parents of two daughters, Pearl and Helen. Both William and his wife are deceased.

Louie Bobst lived in the Fairview area before moving back to Martelle in 1927. After the death of his first wife, Mildred Walters, he was married to Myrtle

ther Larson. He has been in the taurant business and operated a gage since his return to Martelle. He wned and operated a service station med and operated a service station intil his retirement in 1971. Mr. and Mrs. Bobst were the parents of two ughters, Velma Larson and Gladys bst. Mrs. Bobst died in 1969. Louie is still living in their original home in Mortello. Martelle.

Mary, the only Bobst girl, was married to Ralph Wells, and has always resided in the Marion area. They have three children: Clifford, Leland, and

Albert Bobst, the youngest, returned to Martelle in 1933. He entered the plumbing and heating business with Lee Bobst in the hardware store under the name of Bobst Brothers. Albert was married to Eva Fetter and they were the parents of four daughters: Constance, Vivian, Dixie, and Joan. Mrs. Bobst died in 1968. Albert was married to Doris Holcomb James in 1970. Their home is on the farm south of Martelle. Mr. Bobst is still active in the business.

Of the third generation of the Bobst children, three girls still reside in Mar-telle. Gladys, daughter of Louie Bobst, is married to Arlo Kirkpatrick. Their home is in the rural area southwest of Martelle, and they are the parents of

two sons. Steven and Dennis.

Vivian, a daughter of Albert Bobst, is married to Jams Dauber. They are the parents of three children: Leigh, Beth Ann, and James R. Jr. Dixie, also a daughter of Albert Bobst, is married to Walter Ellison. They are residents of Martelle and have no children.

Of maternal lineage of the senior Bobst family, were Sam, Charles, and adrew, who were brothers of Mrs. illip Bobst, and from Pike county, Ohio, came to Martelle in 1886. They were carpenters and during their tenure in Martelle erected the Methodist church parsonage, the homes of Floyd May, Ira Maiden, Dale Arnold, Warren Wickham, Lowell McMann, Otis Anderson, Clifford

Bickel, and the Brockman hotel building.
They moved to Shawnee, Okla. in
1905. Their only relatives in Martelle at the present time are Louie and Albert

Bobst.

WILLIAM BOXWELL

William Boxwell, one of eight children, was born in Pennsylvania Jan. 30, 1830. He came to Iowa in 1845 with his parents who settled in Linn county. He was married to Julia McCreary on Jan. 25, 1865. They were the parents of four children: Frank L., Moses A., Clarence, and Clara.

Frank married to Mary Arminta Ellison; four children: Virtis and Virgil (twins), Hazel D. and Jessie L. Virgil was married to Florence Kline; four children: Howard, Harlan. Roberta and Glenn. Hazel was married to E. L. Patten; one daughter, Lois. Jessie L. is unmarried and resides in retirement

in Martelle.

Moses was married to Margaret English and were the parents of one daughter, Ruth, who is married to L. D. Murfield; two children: Margaret and Norman.

Clarence was married to Mae Hyatt; ne son, Carl.

Clara was married to Clarence Leigh; one daughter, Grace,

ALVA BENJAMIN CAFFEE

Alva Benjamin Caffee, a son of John and Eliza Ruth (Reid), Caffee, Nov. 12, 1853. His parents were early settlers in Fairview township in 1840. Alva Caffee, in 1877, was married to Cassie G. Belden, a daughter of Dr. G. W. and Louisa (Hotchkiss) Belden. They were the parents of: Gladys, Mrs. John Ireland; Alta, Mrs. Charles Darsee; Alva, married to Evelyn Harn; and Olive at home. Mr. Caffee was a member of the Knights of Pythias lodge at Martelle. (1910).

DAVID CLARK

David Clark, son of Oliver and Electa Clark, was born Sept. 25, 1832, in Lorain county, Ohio. His parents, natives of Connecticut, moved to Ohio where they remained until 1939 when they migrated farther westward to Linn county, Iowa, arriving there in Feb., 1840, settling in Franklin township.

Previously, the senior Mr. Clark, in 1837, had entered a claim to land presently the site of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. However, when the family arrived in 1840, he found that his claim had been 'jumped", and as an alternative filed a claim on 160 acres in Franklin township.

Oliver and Electa Clark were the parents of twelve children, three of whom: two daughters and the son,

David survived.

David was married to Mary Boxwell in Mount Vernon, Iowa, April 3, 1861. She was a daughter of Robert and Rhoda Boxwell and had been born in Fayette county, Pa. They were the parents of nine children, all of whom are deceased. The family operated 325 acres of farmland in Linn township, extensively engaged in livestock breeding. Three sons: David Ellsworth, Robert Lennie, and Bertie J. owned the land until their

Bertie J. Clark was married to Austa Arbingast, and were the parents of eight children, of whom three sons, Oliver, Howard and Harley B., reside on the farms. Vital statistics of the Bertie J.

Clark family are:

All of the Clark children were graduated from the Martelle school.

Mr. and Mrs. Don Bunce of Anamosa were the parents of three children: Donald C., Bernard L., and Carol. Don-ald C., a graduate of Martelle schools and the State University at Ames, is married to Beverly Cantrell and have two children. With 12 years of service, he is a Major in the U. S. Air Force stationed at Osan, Korea. Bernard L., Martelle schools and Mankato State college graduate, is associated with Investors Diversified at Minneapolis, Carol, Mrs. Howard Kent Meister, a graduate of the Anamosa schools, resides in Marion, Iowa.

Mrs. Gerald Darsee of Cedar Rapids has two children: Sandra Dollarhide and Jane Ann Dollarhide. Sandra, Mrs. Keith Keller, graduate of Martelle school and Wesleyan college, resides at Abington, Ill. Jane Ann. Mrs. Richard L. Spellerberg, resides at Ely.

GEORGE W. DAVIS

George W. Davis, born Dec. 23, 1843, was a son of George and Susanna Davis, was a son of George and Susanna Davis, natives of Ireland. In 1854, his parents immigrated to Philadelphia, Pa., where Mr. Davis died in April, 1856. The Widow and her family came to Iowa in 1856, first to Linn county then to Jones county.

They were the parents of nine children: James, married to Mary Ann Clark; Thomas F., married to Jane Clark; Inomas F., married to Ruth Kepler; William Davis, married to Ruth Fisher; Martha, Mrs. John McPherson; Ruth, Mrs. John Fink; George W., mar-ried to Anis Jones; Belle, Mrs. Dan Conner; Jane, Mrs. John Oldham; John

A., married to Julia Chapman.

George W. Davis was 12 years old when his mother and her family settled when his mother and her family settled in Jones county, and when he was 18 years old he enlisted in Company I of the Second Iowa Cavalry as Union soldier in the War between the States. After the war, he settled in Greenfield township, and was married on Sept. 18, 1868 to Anie Longs a daughter of 1868, to Anis Jones, a daughter of Thomas and Jane (Tatum) Jones, who came from North Carolina in 1863 and settled in Greenfield township.

Mr. and Mrs. George Davis were the parents of six children: Thomas Ulysses; Harry Elmer, married to Hattie E. Card; three children: Lawrence, Francis, and Elwin: Lottie, married to Philip G. Mohn (dec'd), four children: Ora R., Conrad D., Minnie E., and Florence J.; George Washington, married to Mina Weston, three children: Nellie L., Claud T., and Glen; Ira L., married to Ida B. Abel, four children: Harold E., Anis, George W., and Laura B.; Ora, Mrs Notley Scott, two children: Grace and Carl.

THE DRIPS FAMILY

Isaac and Elizabeth (Myers) Drips were born in Ohio. Their eldest son, George W. Drips, was born in Licking county, Ohio, Feb. 27, 1836. He came to Iowa and in 1857, purchased a farm in Linn county. He was married Jan. 31, 1860, to Mary E., daughter of John and Ellen (Orme) Dunn, born Guernsey county, Ohio, April 1, 1834.

Joseph Scott Drips, youngest of the George W. Drips family, was born Oct. 1, 1875. He was married, March 20, 1901, to Frances Idella Hempy, who was born Jan. 20, 1881 and died in 1942.
Mr. Drips died Dec. 2, 1943. They were the parents of two sons: George Lafe, and Linn Trafford.

George Lafe was born Dec. 15, 1901, and on Feb. 25, 1934, was married to Gladys Eldora Howland, born Aug. 19, 1902. They have one daughter, Elaine,

and reside in Marion.

Linn Trafford, born Aug. 18, 1921, is married to Helen Luker; four children: Joseph Scott, Betty Jane, Roger Linn, and Mary Lou. Their home is in Straw-berry Point, Iowa. Their son, Joseph Scott, is married to Dianne Higgins and teaches at Tripoli, Iowa. Their daughter, Mary Lou Schmidt, resides at Garnavillo,

They were the parents of eleven children: James, married to Hannah Ray; Frank, married to Alwilder Hunter and after her death he was married to Sarah Streach Lemmer Paul; Charles, married to Ellen Boon and after her death he was married to her sister, Jane Boon; Joseph, married to Lucy Wilton; Hulda, married to Joseph Kohl; Mary Arminta, married to Frank Boxwell; Nancy, married to Jasper Wood; Linnie,

married to John Mohn; John Jr., married to Daisy Joslin; Clara, married to Frank Myers; and Bertie, married to George

John Ellison was instrumental in the early promotion of Martelle. He built the houses on the north side of Ellison He also street, eponym of his name. built the Brockman hotel building. Ellison's addition is also named after John

E. Ellison and was platted in 1892 as part of Martelle.

Six of his children, their families and descendants have resided in Martelle at different times. As of now (1971), only two descendants: Jessie Boxwell, a granddaughter, and Walter Ellison, a great-grandson, are residents of Martella.

JAMES P. ELLISON

James P. Ellison, founder of the Martelle bank, was born on a farm three miles north of Mount Vernon, Iowa, April 26, 1851, and was a son of Samuel and Mary (Scott) Ellison. The senior Mr. Ellison arrived in Linn county in 1840 and was married to Mary Scott in 1848. They became the parents of: William G., who resides on the old homestead, James P., Martelle; Mrs. Ruth A. Chamberlain, Mount Vernon; Mrs. Mary M. Oxley, Marion, and Mrs. Jane Platner, Mechanicsville. The death of Samuel Ellison occurred March 23, 1888. Mrs. Ellison still survives and is now (1910) residing in Mount Vernon.

(The above material and the following are a condensation of the James P. Ellison biographical sketch as it appeared in the 1910 Jones county history.)

James P. Ellison was reared on the old homestead and on Jan. 2, 1884, was united in marriage to Eva Newman, a daughter of Emanuel and Elizabeth (Spade) Newman. They were the parents of Samuel H. and Ethel G.

An extensive land owner in Jones county, Mr. Newman saw the need for a bank and founded the Martelle bank in 1901. That same year he erected the two-story brick block at the intersection of Marion and Iowa streets. The structure originally housed the Martelle bank and other Newman interests including an opera house on the second floor. He met his death in a car-train crash in 1921.

Religious affiliations of the family were with the Church of Christ at Martelle. Mr. Newman served as a township trustee, on the school board, and twice on the United States grand jury.

The son, Samuel H., (dec'd) married to Florence McCarn, had no children. The daughter, Ethel, married to Edward C. Gotsch has two children: James. married to Mildred Peet; and Dr. Ruth Gotsch, unmarried.

G. J. Hakes, born Oct. 17, 1829, in Chenango county, N. Y., came to Jones county in 1847, and in 1876 with W. P. Leonard strated a general merchandise business in Martelle. He was married to Phoebe Rundall; six children: Nancy, Montague, Addison, James, Ella, and Hattie. Hattie was married to Alphonso Port; eight children: Claude, Clelland, DeVer, Mary, Devilla, John, Martha, and one deceased. The Hakes farm was located at the north edge of Martelle, where Mayme Pospishil now resides.

MARION ANSON HEMPY

Marion Anson Hempy was born in Jones county on June 1, 1850. He was the fourth of nine children of George and Drucilla (Miller) Hempy: Mrs. Sophia Staab, Mrs. Anna Pieper, Mrs. Calla Stearns, Tom, Lafe, Jake, Ben, and George Ira.

Marion Anson Hempy was married March 5, 1882, to Annetta Kohl, daughter of Amos and Anna Maria (Grimm) Kohl. They were the parents of one son: Ira Lewis, born May 20, 1885. Both Mr. and Mrs. Hempy died at the family

home; Mr. Hempy on July 13, 1922 and Mrs. Hempy on Dec. 24, 1938.

Ira Lewis Hempy acquired his education at the Greenfield Center school. He was married to Grace Estella Krumroy. They were the parents of a daughter, Violet Annetta; a son, Ivan Marion, and a daughter, Verlean Gertrude, who died in infancy. Mr. and Mrs. Hempy oc-cupied the Hempy farm until Sept., 1953, when they retired to Anamosa. Mr. Hempy died Dec. 1, 1964, and Mrs. Hempy May 10, 1968.

Frank Hoffman was born May 12, 1849, in Switzerland. He immigrated in 1852 to Scott county, Iowa, from where he came to Martelle in 1872 and opened the first general merchandise store which he operated for 45 years, from 1875 for several years in partner-ship with L. T. Blackledge.

Married to Sophia Paulstian in 1869. Mr. and Mrs. Hoffman were the parents of two daughters, Cora Belle Brown and Mable Clara Brown. Mrs. Hoffman died in 1872 in Martelle. In Oct., 1881, Mr. Hoffman was married to Caroline Rupf, who was born March 26, 1853. They became the parents of five children: Lillian, Andrew, Rosebud, Elva, and Cornelia.

Mr. Hoffman was one of the original stockholders and the first president of the Farmers Savings bank in Martelle. He served as postmaster, was a member of the town council, and treasurer of the town and of the school district. Mr. and Mrs. Hoffman were charter members of the Knights of Pythias and Pythian Sisters. Mr. Hoffman died on Sept. 18, 1925, and Mrs. Hoffman on July 7, 1933.

The children by Mr. Hoffman's second marriage were: Lillian, Mrs. Thomas J. Stewart; Rosebud, Mrs. Howard Clements (dec'd), then Mrs. Homer Allen; Cornelia, Mrs. Clayton Murfield; Elva; Andrew, married to Lenore Graaff.

Of the children, Elva has lived all of her life in Martelle, and Cordelia, Mrs. Clayton Murfield, has spent all of her life in Martelle and Greenfield township.

THE HOLCOMB FAMILY

(1836-1916) and Sarah Pierce (1836-1908) Holcomb came to Linn county, Iowa, from Pennsylvania in the mid-1850s. They later moved to Greenfield township, Jones county, Iowa, where they secured the homestead that Dillon Holcomb now farms southeast of Martelle. The old farm house constructed of hand-hewn timbers, doweled and pinned, nailed with square nails, still

stands although not used as a residence.

Mr. Kohl was married in 1876 to Mary Amanda Kline, born Aug. 26, 1857, a daughter of John F. and Catherine (Hickathorn) Kline, of Prairieburg, Iowa. They were the parents of five sons and one daughter: Mrs. Lona Smith (dec'd), Eldon Lewis (Del), Lisbon, Iowa; Harry Amos (dec'd); DeWitt Kohl, married Florence Vernon, Marion, Iowa; Lowell Delos (dec'd), married Bertha Shoop, and Otto Albert, Blair House, Cedar Rapids.

Children of Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Kohl: Marguerite Meisner, Lillian Wright, Jessie Brown, Rena Richardson.

KUNTZ FAMILY HISTORY

History of the Kuntz family records that the father of Jacob Kuntz Jr., first of the family to come to Iowa, was a soldier in the French army under Napoleon. Natives of Alsace-Lorraine, the Kuntz family immigrated to Pennsylvania when Jacob Jr. was two years old in 1832. He was married Jan. 13, 1848, to Susana Grauel, after whose death he was married to Elizabeth Review married.

REMINGTON FAMILY

History of the Remington family in Iowa started in 1849, when Samuel Remington and his wife, Mary Ann, and their son, Eliphalet, left Alloway, N. Y., with their destination Fairview, an original settlement southwest of Anamosa, Inal Settlement southwest of Anamosa, Iowa. The trip was made by canal boat and stagecoach. Since Alloway was a rural community adjacent to Lyons, N.Y., on the Erie canal, the boat segment of the journey apparently was on that canal to Buffalo, N.Y.

When they reached Calent W. 34

When they reached Galena, Ill., Mr. Remington became seriously ill, and although medical attention was immediately procured, he died within 24 hours from an affliction thought to have been

appendicitis.

Mrs. Remington and her son, Eliphalet, continued on to Fairview where they remained until 1851, when Mrs. Remington was married to Joseph Norman Kirby. They were the parents of one daughter, Mary Elizabeth, who was married to George Penn, and after his death

to C. W. Webster.

Joseph Norman Kirby (Joseph Norman and his wife, Mary Ann Remington) settled on land south of Martelle, where they established a stagecoach stop with hotel accommodations and a post office. The stagecoach stop was known as the Elk Horn tavern, and the site as Prospect Hill. No dates are available, other than those in the records of the United States Post Office department, which show that the first post office in the area was established at Prospect Hill, approximately a mile south of Martelle, on Dec. 9, 1872. Charles W. Ormsby was commissioned as the first post-
