OBITUARY OF HENRY KOHL

Henry Kohl, second child born to Amos and Anna Maria Kohl on March 4, 1856 at Monroe, Wisconsin and passed away Wednesday morning, April 1, 1942, at the age of 86 years, in the home of his son DeWitt, in Marion.

He came with his parents to Jones County in 1864 where he grew to manhood. On December 5, 1876 he was married to Mary Amanda Kline. He is survived by his widow, five sons, Eldon of Marion, Harry of Redfield, Ia., DeWitt of Marion, Lowell of Martelle and Otto of Cedar Rapids, and a daughter, Mrs. Leona Smith of Huron, S. Dakota. 17 grandchildren and five great grandchildren. A brother, Lewis Kohl of the White Oak neighborhood and three sisters, Mrs. Emma Stearns and Mrs. Minnie McNeal of Cedar Rapids and Mrs. Tena Melton of Mechanicsville and a host of neices and nephews.

He was a member of the White Rose lodge K. of P. in Martelle and the Lisbon Methodist church. He served on the Lisbon town council for many years.

Mr. Kohl was instrumental in helping erect the White Oak Evangelical church and active in all community affairs.

Mr. and Mrs. Kohl retired from the farm, moving to Martelle in 1910, after a few years they moved to Lisbon, where he built a fine home, where his aged widow resides.

He will be greatly missed by his family, friends and associates.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Joseph Gray of Mt. Vernon on Friday at 2:00 p. m. from the G. B. Johnston funeral home in Mt. Vernon. Burial was Lisbon cemetery, with his grandsons as pallbearers.

Mrs. H. F. Kohl, Lisbon, Dies After Long Illness

Mrs. H. F. Kohl, 89, of Lisbon, died in a local hospital Wednesday at 8 a.m. after a long illness. Born Aug. 26, 1857, at Oil City, Pa., she had lived in the Lisbon vicinity for 79 years.

Mr. Kohl died four years ago. Surviving are five sons, E. L. Kohl of Lisbon, Harry of Redfield, DeWitt of Marion, Otto of Cedar Rapids and Lowell of Martelle; 16 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. A daughter, Mrs. Leona Smith, died four years ago.

Also surviving are a sister, Ella Kline, and a brother, H. P. Kline, both of Marion.

The body is at the Johnson funeral home at Lisbon. Services will be announced later.

Mrs. Kohl was a member of the Federated church, the Legion Auxiliary, and was a Gold Star Mother. She lived the last 20 years in Lisbon.

Her courage was born of an unwavering faith and helped her to endure many afflictions. She was an inspiration to her family and friends.

Surviving are her husband, Eldon, her two daughters, three grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

The Town That Didn't Make It

MARTELLE — During the search for material for inclusion in the Martelle centennial history, preliminary information uncovered several obscure episodes in area history, one of which revealed that the first attempt to establish a town in the vicinity occurred in 1852, more than 20 years before Martelle was founded.

In southwestern Jones county, Martelle was founded in the fall of 1872 at the junction of the Military road and the then newly-constructed Sabula, Ackley and Dakota railroad, now the main line of the Milwaukee. The Military road, first federally authorized highway in the Iowa territory, extended from Dubuque through Martelle and Iowa City to the Missouri state line.

Called Norwich

Site of the first endeavor to establish a town was located three-fourths of a mile north of Martelle, on land presently part of the Richard C. Goldsmith and Frank Travis (formerly Ray C. Peet) farms. Name selection was Norwich in honor of that city in New York.

Promoted by Amos Breed, Robert Miller and Jacob Soper, the town site, astride the Greenfield-Fairview township line, consisted of four blocks of eight lots each with three streets: Cherry, Orange and Cedar. Ownership of the land was divided between Breed and Miller in Greenfield township and Soper in Fairview.

Required legal formalities were a knowledge by P. R.

Skinner, a notary public, on July 6, 1852, at which time Joseph Mann, the county judge, approved and ordered the plat entered in Jones county records as the official site of the town of Norwich. Development of the project, however, never progressed beyond the paper stage.

Conjectures concerning the fate of the promotion includes one that the town failed to materialize because the railroad bypassed the location; a second suggests that the site eventually became the Norwich cemetery. Records indicate though that both assumptions are incorrect.

As far as the time element is concerned, the belief that the burial grounds were established on the abandoned town site bears acknowledgment; however, legal descriptions locate the memorial area one-half mile north of the Norwich town site. The cemetery association register indicates that the Norwich cemetery was founded in 1865, and developed around a private plot where the first burial was in 1848.

Railway Factor

The other and most popular conception infers that non-development of the town resulted when the Milwaukee line rails laid in 1872 bypassed the site. Although failure to obtain rail facilities was the main factor, demise of the promotion is directly attributable to an earlier and unsuccessful venture in 1852, when the Iowa Central Airline railway was projected westward from Sabula through Maquoketa, Anamosa, Marion, Cedar Rapids to California.

According to his notes and a historical sketch prepared by F.M. Bishop, Jones county surveyor, the stakes marking the route of the right-of-way passed adjacent to the site of the town of Norwich.

Because of alleged poor management, the railroad failed and in 1859 with only a few miles of roadbed graded, one section in Jones county and one between Lyons and Maquoketa, the project was abandoned.

Part of the roadbed of the exploded Airline company found its way into ownership of the Midland, a Des Moines based operation organized in 1870. That company completed the line into Maquoketa that same year.

Construction stopped at that point until 1871, when the North Western gained control and immediately extended the project westward, terminating at Anamosa in 1871.

Trains to Anamosa

By that time, the Dubuque & Western (C.M.St.P.&P.) from Dubuque through Monticello had been running trains into Anamosa since 1860, through Viola and Springville to Marion since 1865. In eastern Jones county, in 1871, the tracks of the Sabula, Ackley & Dakota (main line of the C.M.St.P.&P.) were being laid to terminate at Marion in 1873.

So, for the Midland with no place to go, Anamosa was the end of the line. And that was how Norwich tried to become a town and didn't.

Martelle will observe its centennial July 2, 3 and 4.

The stream takes its name from
JOSHUA BEERS, the first settler
on the creek. He commenced an
improvement near its mouth in
the Fall of 1836. SOLOMON J.
PENCE and his brother having

had prospected the country all
over, and they directed Mr.
BEERS to an eligible location
on the stream which from then
took his name. There is enough
interest in the life and
adventures of Mr. BEERS to fill
quite a volume; but as I have
but few items of his history I
shall not attempt to do him
justice. I hope that hereafter
that the name of that stream
will be spelled with 5 letters,
as there is no Dutch drink
about it; but it is named after
a man every way worthy of such
an honor.

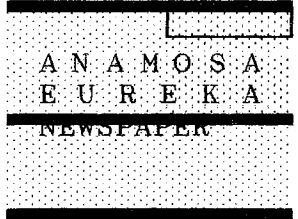
