"Death of Robert Wilkinson", May 26, 1898, Anamosa <u>Eureka</u>, Page 8, Whole No. 2171, Vol. 42, No. 39.

"An Old Veteran, a Good Citizen and a Kind Father at Rest. The death of Robert Wilkinson, as briefly announced in our last issue, occurred at his residence in Anamosa, Wednesday, May 18, at 8:30 a.m. He had been quite seriously ill for several weeks with heart trouble, so that when the end came it was in accord with the general expectation of the community. The funeral obsequies were held Friday at 10:30 a.m. at the Presbyterian church, conducted by Rev. W. E. Glanville of the Baptist church, which was as follows:

Instrumental voluntary, Mrs. W. B. Skinner; hymn by the choir, "Some Sweet Day," reading of portions of the 23d and 46th Psalm, John 14th and Revelations 7th; hymn, "I am Sweeping through the Gates;" obituary and sermon Rev. Glanville.

Robert Wilkinson was born in Beaver county, Penn., Oct. 16th, 1824, and died May 18th, 1898. In July of 1849 he was married to Nancy E. McLaire (McLane) in Fairview, West Virginia. In 1855 he with his family removed to Iowa. In 1863 he enlisted in Co. K., 24th Iowa, and served to the close of the war. He joined the Presbyterian church in Wyoming and brought a letter from that place, uniting with the Presbyterian church in Anamosa. He was the father of seven children, five of whom, Finley J., Curtis R., Porter S., Lizzie and Victoria are living. He was a good soldier, a loving father, and respected citizen."

This brief sketch was followed by appropriate remarks. So the old friend leaves us, said Mr. Glanville. This earth is a place of changes. We hardly get acquainted before we learn that here is not our abiding place. The aged realize that life is not what it once was. You cannot face the storm or endure the labor as once you did. As you look over the path you see many places vacant, many of your friends and neighbors have been laid away. But man is more than body. The Scriptures say...(lots more)

The remains were taken to Wyoming and placed in the family lot, where one daughter, Nevada, nine years of age is buried. Members of the Grand Army at Wyoming met the hearse and the family at the cemetery and acted as pallbearers and assisted in the final services and tributes to a worthy veteran, an upright citizen and kind father.

The pallbearers here were P.C. Hartman, M.H. Walker, Frank Cooper, David Heisey, J.H. Lamson, and Richard Rosencrans. The choir consisted of...

The pulpit was appropriately draped with an American flag and the floral decorations were exceedingly beautiful...(Floral description) There were present at the services in Anamosa a large number of the membership of Fred Steele Post...

Those of the family from abroad were a daughter, Mrs. Will O. VanNess, and her husband of Clinton, and a son, Mr. Curtis Wilkinson of Marshalltown. Another son, F.J. living in Calhoun county, could not be present on account of sickness in his family.

THE GREEN SCHOOL 1850-1918

Rome township was organized as a township on July 5,1842. The west part of the township was settled first, according to Vol.I of the Jones Co. History.

The first school in this area was organized and financed by neighbors, in 1846. School was held in the Washington Lamb cabin, this site being the present Mrs. Melvin Deermann farm.

On Jan.8, 1849, Thomas and Effa Green deeded a plot of land in Section 5 of Rome Twp.for the site of District School No. 5, referred to thereafter as "The Green School".

One page of plain paper with lines drawn in ink, dated Dec. 16, 1850, written in beautiful penmanship, by the teacher, Lorenzo D. Bates, lists the school directors as Jacob Miller, Andrew Sunday and Alexander Roney.

There were forty students, namely Tyler Sunday, James Tallman, Benton, John, Emily and Rebecca Green, Rhoda, Margaret, Mary Jane and Elizabeth Foreman, Clinton Crawford, Barbara and John Pfeifer, Rebecca Herling, Geo. and Jacob Lamb, Elizabeth, John and Louis Starry, Wm. Cresey, Henry, Issac, Wm., Alanand Mar, E. Harrison, Wm. Smith, W. O. Beam, David, Ames and Jacob Miller, Geo. and E.B. Fall, Har ist and Phebe Sherman, Michael Lomunyon, Peter and two other children (names not visible) Betzer.

Pupils were from sections 5-6-7-8-9-17 and 18. The education taught was the "Three R's" and Orthography(spelling).

An attendence book dated from Dec. 1865 to Jan. 1878 listed pupils from 4 to 21 years of age. School was in session in Dec., Jan., and Feb. and in the following May, June and July. Some of the older children didn't attend the summer session.

Teachers were Mary Jane Foreman and James Tallman(pupils of the 1850 school)also E.J.Cook, Chas.F.Klise, Eva Foreman, Elizabeth Tallman, Mary Kirby E.A.Southwick, Mary A.Klinefelter, Celia Foster, C.A.Foreman, Salinda E.Fugh, Wm. Rudisill, Calvin Sones and also the 1850 teacher L.D.Bates.

The record book recorded the days present, number of times tardy and the number of minutes tardy. The minutes ranged from 2 to 135, (someone must have got lost in the woods.)

The best grade for any subject was IO and the poorest \$.4. The average number of pupils was thirty two and also up to 9 out of the district, which were from sections I7 and I8. (and Bickers faffs 4 Lambs, new in Greenfield Two hp.)

Subjects taught were Reading, Spelling, Arithmetic, Mental Arithmetic, History, Grammar, Composition and Declamation.

A note on Feb. 3.1075 stated there was no school, due to a snowstorm and school was not held on July 4th, 1876.

Three pages in the back of the book was signed by visitors to the school several from Vircqua(Morley), Highland Grove and the Co.Supt.C.R.Champleon. Remarks followed each visitors name and read, "A fullschool, good order, scholars attentive and good morals taught."

A receipt in the book read as follows-

This is to Certify that Rome Tsp.District has paid to the Treasurer of Jones Co. the sum of \$5.25, in fullinterest to Apr.I3, I867 on note made by said Ditrict to the School Fund of said Co., dated Oct.29, I866, for Five Hundred and Twenty Five Dollars, as shown by Treasurers Receipt.J,C.Dietz Clerk

Rome Tsp. census for Apr. 1867 was 408 children. Green school attendence was 41. At this time the Jones Co. school fund, apportioned 88 ¢ per pupil.

Before the Center Church was built in the early 1870's, Sundayschool, Wo--rship Service and singing school was held in the schoolhouse.

The 1892 summer session had 24 pupils namely, Chas. and Ella Corwin, Frank and Hattie Ganser, Jennie, Nellie, May, Allie, and Bill Hughes, Gertie and twin boys Hewitt, Sadie and Gertie Hotz, Delia Jacobs, Minnie and John McFarlin, Verna Miller, Stella and Nellie Moyer, Jennie and Herbert Smith, Ellsworth Tallman and Olin Sunday.

ne teacher was Eva Byerly.

In 1903 Howard Young was the teacher. Cyrus Lamb was Director, Will Tallmar was Sect. and C.B. Paul was Co. Supt.

Students were Clarence, Albert and Mabel Boots.Nora and Elfa Boyd.Nellie Carey.Mary, Belle and Bessie Easterly.Alta Farnham.Otho,Leslie,Nelson,Jennie Katie and Amber Hughes.Orpha and Zella Hotz.Bertha, May, Hattie and Frank Ganser.Kizzie Miller.Chas. Maiden.Mae McMurrin.Martha and John Jurgensen. May Pavin.Marion,Laura,Fern,Dessie and Mary Tallman.Delbert and Kenneth Smith.Sammie Weaver.Theresa and Harold Young.

In later records The Green school became No.4. The school at Morley, built in 1909 was recorded as NO.5.

In 1909 Carrie Page was the teacher.Her salary was \$48.88 per month. Other known teachers were-Frank Barton,Norman Bickel,Irene Brady,Myrtle Bixler,Annie Ernst,Earl Duncan,Hattie Ganser,Carolyn Miller Hay,Kate Hansen Alonzo Hunter,Frank Kroulic,Mildred Ladd,Ida Lake,Cyrus Lamb,Fannie Clay Mershon,Dave Farnham,Myrtle Farnham Miller,Lena Miller,Daisy McCleary

Miller, Flora Fisher Moore, Rose Tallman Neff, Edna Griffith Newlin, Gladys Shoop Peet, Erma Rose, Annie Shaw, Bert Stingley, John Kramar and Mildred Turtlelot.

Miss Florence Miller living east of Morley, is the great grandaughta of Jacob Miller, one of the first directors. Her grandmother was of the Green family, who gave the land for the school and her mother Mrs. Myrtle Farnham Miller attended and later taught in 1889, at the Green, at the age of 16 for \$22. per month.

In the years 1914 through 1918, the teachers were Beulah Byerly Miller, Irene and Mae Brownell, Grace Grassfield Seegar, Agnes Foarde and Vera Ror--ah Ireland.

The secretaries book listed prices paid for loads of wood for heating the school, repairs to the outhouses and one person earned 50¢ for scrubbing the schoolhouse floors, before school began in the fall.

The Green school building was moved to Morley in 1919 and used for classes until the Morley Cons. School was built in 1921.

Essie Coleman was the last teacher in the green school building. It was later used as a schoolhack shelter.

Mrs. Grace Grassfield Seegar of Morley, Mrs. Edna Griffith Newlin of Viola and Mrs. Beulah Byerly Miller are the only Known living teachers.

The above information was compiled by Mrs. Harlan Tallman, from the Jones Co. History, excellant memories of some Senior Citizens, school record books carefully preserved by Avert Cook and Ivan Duncan and a deed transaction belonging to Mary B. Tallman, who resides on the site of "The Green School".

TOBYNE - At the residence of John Hayden in Monticello Thursday morning, November 11, Mrs. Sarah Tobyne, of old age.

Mrs. Tobyne was born in lower Canada in the year 1797, and hence was 89 years of age at the time of her death. She was married at Plattsburg, N Y to John Tobyne, a soldier of the War of 1812, by whom she had thirteen, Mrs. Hayden being the oldest, only four of whom survive. Her husband died in January, 1850, and since then she has lived with her children, the last five years being spent with Mrs. Hayden, by whom she was most tenderly and kindly cared for. She was a woman of remarkably strong constitution and during her long and eventful life, suffered no serious illness. Without pain or suffering she quietly and peacefully passed down into the valley and shadow and came to her grave in a full age, like as a shock of corn cometh in his season.
