TO THE PLEASANT HILL
HOME-COMING FOOKS

Greeting:-

On the receipt of the invitation to come to the 1932 Home-Coming of the Old Pleasant Hill Church, a flood of memories forces themselves upon me, and all of those of blessed memory are before me. How I prize those young people that helped shape my life. They are not a few and much of what I have been able to do in the great work for the Master can be attributed to those young people who put nothing in the way of my Christian Life, but much was given to help me along. Never will I forget the day I was received into the membership of the Church as good old Father Smith came along and laid his hand on my head and said, "God bless you Johnnie." So today I am rejoicing with you in coming together as old friends and now to renew old memories and make new friendships.

Perhaps you are entitled to know somewhat of the way the Lord has lead and blessed since leaving the old home place along with Mrs. Wolfe in 1889. We spent eight years in Hillsdale College, Michigan, graduating in 1897 and going directly to the pastorate of the Free Will Baptist Church of Lincoln, Nebraska. We spent five years of delightful work with this church and twelve years at different times as pastor of the old Grandview Church at Adams, Nebraska. For ten years I was Field Secretary for Nebraska and Kansas until I broke down when I was in the County Treasurer's office in Tecumseh, Nebraska for five years doing much church work during this time.

I had the joy of starting the Tecumseh College in Tecumseh, Oklahoma and its President for the three years. And for all these thirty-five years I have held the office of Chairman of the Executive Board of the State for our denomination, likewise the same office for the National General Conference and was the Moderator for our confer-

DEATH OF CORA PORTER SMITH 1917

"No time for a last farewell
No time for the shock of fear
Scarcely a moment's halt on the shore
With the guide and boatman near
Dearest how surprised you were to go
With much to suffer, little to know.

Only a moment of dark
A dream of the fleeting night,
And then the beautiful break of day
And the quiet peace of night,
And you found yourself where you
longed to stand
In the repose of the fatherland.

Cora Belle Porter, the beloved daughter of John C. and Arabella Porter, commenced her earthly career September 5, 1887, in Cedar County, Iowa, and slipped away from life's troubled moorings in the brief meridian of life, June 1, 1917.

Her early years were spent on the home farm, moving to a farm near Olin in 1902. Here she graduated from the Olin High School, and here she experienced the joys of salvation, being converted at the age of 14, and uniting with the M. E. church at Olin. As a faithful attendant, she loved the house of God, and was happiest when singing the sweet song of Zion, or when busy with the Master's service with her Sunday school class, or in church work, or Aid Society, efficient and aggressive.

On January 17, 1911, she cast her lot in the sacred partnership of marriage with Herbert P. Smith. Six years of happy life on the farm were theirs, when they moved to Morley last fall.

On Friday morning last, with the tide of weakened physique setting strong against her, the good ship Motherhood, so prayerfully awaited, storm-tossed and weather beaten, sank just outside the port. Watchful care and sympathetic help were hers, but death came, silent, ruthless, remorseless, who stops not at medical skill nor tender nursing; that answers not to our tearful call. All must submit to earthly limitation and to the call of earth's mightiest conqueror. Our steps are numbered. We soon fly away. Even as the verdure of green fades under the sudden blighting frost of autumn, so the last requiem is sounded, we bury our dead. But the green leaf of immortality shall not fade, death itself shall be conquered and the influence of a noble life shall not cease. As the brave wife waited for but a moment beside that silent sea, where the boat with muffled oar was ready to bear her away, she spoke of her faith in Christ that wave did not and sustained her in the crisis.

1915

James Oscar, eldest son of Thomas and Mary Austin, was born in Hale township, Jones County, Iowa, April 16, 1866, and passed away at his home near Morley, April 30, 1915, aged 49 years and 14 days.

Ott, as he was familiarly called, grew to manhood in the township of his birth. On December 31, 1888, he was united in marriage with his childhood friend, Sadie M. Coon. To this union were born six children—Goldie Luana, now Mrs. Thomas Saukup, of Hale township; Leland Guy, Oren Glenn, Bessie Luella, Freddie Loren and James Oscar Jr., all at home.

Besides his immediate family there are left to mourn his death, his aged mother, two grandchildren, four sisters and three brothers, his father and two sisters having preceded him to the world beyond.

In the winter of 1901, he was converted and baptized, after which he united with the Pleasant Hill Church, remaining a member of that church until promoted by death.

As a husband, father, son, brother and friend, Ott was all that could be desired, and with his going a place is made vacant in the home and community that cannot be filled. But why should we despair? Let us remember that God, through Jesus Christ, has given us a blessed hope of again being with our loved ones in the home beyond—a home where sorrow nor death shall never come, and where we shall be re-united throughout all eternity.

The funeral was held last Sunday. An automobile procession had been planned, but the copious rain made teams a necessity. Consequently the funeral party reached the church at Pleasant Hill two hours late. There a large number of old neighbors and friends were patiently awaiting to show respect for the dead, and sympathy for the living. A quartet from Morley very appropriately rendered the music, with Miss Stingley at the organ. The sermon was preached by Rev. Jesse M. Smith, of the Olin M. E. church. The interment was made in the Diamond cemetery, which is the family burial ground. The floral decorations were very lovely.

Thursday evening the freshman boys played the eighth graders. The freshies won 10-4.

H. J. Petersen from near Monmouth on the eastern side of Wyoming township, reports five shoats which were born on the 7th of July 1928. On January 21st, 1929, Mr. Petersen shipped three of these shoats which tipped the beam at 920 pounds. The top one weighed 360 pounds. Just after this Mr. Petersen butchered one of the shoats for home consumption which weighed 340 pounds when killed the other one was butchered on the 5th day of December and sold to John Latare for domestic use. This shoat weighed 225 pound when killed. Mr. Petersen used no stock food whatever in growing this bunch of shoats—the daily rations being corn, milk and plenty wood ashes. They were always ready for their meals and made a rapid growth. Mr. Petersen remarked that the shoats were clean inside and out. A party standing at our elbow remarked that it took Mr. Petersen to raise the shoats but his daughter could raise poultry. During the past season the daughter raised and sold over \$700 worth of poultry. There is money in farming if you use your head.

J. W. Allen of Monmouth was a caller Friday. He remarked that 36 years ago that day was a different day than last Friday. Way back 36 years ago it blowed and snowed so hard you could not see "across the road" as we used to say. But he was satisfied. We are having enough winter to suit him.

Mr. George W. Brown died at the home of his son Chas. M. near this place on the 4th of October of blood poisoning, aged 79 years 5 months, 7 days. The deceased was born in North Carolina, April 27th, 1816, and went to Indiana, with his parents when 12 years of age. There he married Miss Minerva Green in 1839. There were seven children by this union, only one of whom survives; Wilson L. Brown of Garner, Arkansas. Mrs. Brown died in 1851, and he married Mrs. Maria Johnson in 1853. They came to Jones Co. and settled in Wayne township in 1855. To them were born two children, Chas. M. and Jennie, the latter dying several years ago. Soon after Mrs. Brown died, and he married Mrs. Eliza Overly of Johnsonton, in 1860, who presented him with two sons, James and Emerson, who reside in Kansas. Thus he was the father of 11 children. In 1873 a legal separation was effected between him and his wife, and he returned to Indiana, where he was married the fourth time to Mrs. S. J. Randall of Plainfield, Ind., who still survives him. Mr. Brown has made his home since June 1889, with his son Chas. M. Brown, where he was tenderly cared for during a long and painful illness. During more than half his life, Mr. Brown was a member of the Christian church, and died in the as-

urance of life eternal. His life was one of unceasing activity. He was a lover of home, and at the fireside of his son, where the grandchildren honored his presence and his approving smile, he will be greatly missed. The funeral services were held at the family residence, last Sunday, October 6th, being conducted by Rev. A. M. Case.

Mrs. Rosie Yousse, the wife of Mr. Wayne W. Yousse of Wayne township, died last Sunday morning at five o'clock, after a long illness, at the early age of 20 years, 10 months and 19 days. Mr. William Clark, one of the old time residents of Scotch Grove township, died near Tarkio, Missouri, February 16th, 1905. He came to Jones county, Iowa, from Mercer county, Pennsylvania, about the year 1855, and settled in Scotch Grove township, where he lived until his removal to Missouri, about the year 1882. During his twenty-seven years' residence in Jones county, Mr. Clark was highly regarded by his acquaintances. He was a cousin of Mr. Robert Clark, now living in Scotch Grove township, and the nephew of Mr. Matthias Sweesy of Monticello.

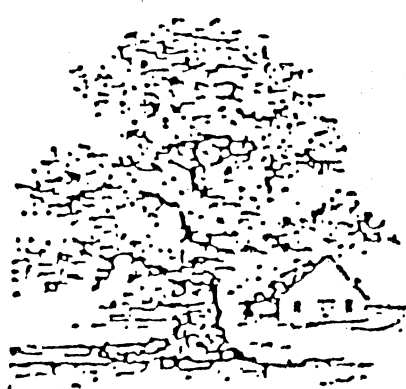
