Death's Hand Reaps Busily.

Occurance of Deaths that Arouse Local Interest.
Jan 8 1903 Monticello Express

JOHN FORD, AGED 91 YEARS, DIES AT MARENGO, IOWA.

Mr. John Ford, for many years a well known and esteemed resident of Monticello, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Baumer, at Marengo, Iowa, at 5 o'clock a. m., Saturday, January 3rd. The remains were brought to Monticello at 11 o'clock p. m. of the same day, and taken to the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Wm. J. Good, where they remained until the time of the funeral. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. W. E. Van Buren at the Methodist Episcopal church of Monticello, last Sunday fore-

noon, and the remains were taken to Cascade for burial.

Mr. Ford was born in County Monaghan, Ireland, January 10, 1812, consequently he was aged 90 years, 11 months and 23 days at the time of his death. At the age of thirteen years he was left an orphan, with the partial care of a family of younger brothers and sisters. He was deprived of educational advantages because it was necessary for him to go to work at an early age in order to support the family. At the time of the celebration of his ninetieth anniversary, at Monticello, a year ago, he stated that at the age of 37 years he was a renter on a four acre tract of land, every foot of which he turned with a spade, and which had to furnish support for a family of nine persons.

Soon thereafter he came to the United States. He left his family in the Old World, and commenced work on a farm in Pennsylvania for \$5 per month. After a short period of farm work, he obtained a position in the iron works at Safe Harbor. He labored two years uninterruptedly at the face of a blast furnace, in order to secure money enough to pay for the transportation of his family to America.

After bringing his family to Safe Harbor, he remained there five years, when he secured a better position in a rolling mill at Johnstown. He became assistant to the foreman of the

mill, but after four years' work he came west, about the time of the beginning of the Civil war, and purchased a farm in Richland township, Jones county, Iowa. He sold it later and bought one in the vicinity of Center Junction. Sixteen years ago he retired from the farm and came to Monticello, where he lived until last spring, after his wife's death. Since that time he made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Baumer. Mr. Ford was a jovial, good-natured man and a host of friends. He had been a member of the Methodist Episcopal church since the age of 25.

Mrs. Ellen Sawyer, an aged and respected resident of Wyoming, died at her home in town, Wednesday, September 17th, 1813, at the age of 88 years, 8 months and 9 days. She had been an invalid for several years, and had been confined to her bed for nearly three years. During these years she has been cared for tenderly, and all that willing hands could do, was cheerfully done for her comfort and welfare. For nearly sixty years she had been a resident of Jones county, and out of this time, she has lived in Wyoming thirty-three years. Her early years were spent in Quebec, and on March 24, 1845, she was united in marriage with Eli Sawyer. To this marriage, six children were born, four of whom survive, namely, Mrs. Celia Arnold, of Cedar Rapids; Mrs. Tressa Cochran, of Olarkaville, Miss Emma Sawyer and Mrs. Eva Brainard, of this place. She is also survived by ten grandchildren, thirsaen great-grand-children and also one great-great-grand-child. The funeral service was held at the home, Friday forenoon, the service being conducted by Rev. O. C. Dupuy, pastor of the M. E. church. Following the service the body was buried in the Wyoming cemetery. The deceased was a woman, well known by our early residents. She will be remembered for her many acts of kindness to those about her. She was of a cheerful disposition and was thoughtful of those around her. She has enjoyed the respect of all who knew her. To this union were born four children, Elmer Bernard, who died Jan. 8th, 1897, and Clifford, who died four days later, both of diphtheria; Guida Berenice, aged six, and Mabel Marie, aged three, are left with their father to mourn the loss of a devoted wife and mother. Besides these, she leaves a mother, Mrs. Melissa Ryan, and two brothers, Loren and Charles, all of Anamosa, Iowa, and three sisters, Mrs. Jane Belknap and Mrs. Daisy Ruhl, of Fairview township, and Mrs. Carrie Byerly, of Jackson township.

The deceased had been in frail health for some years, but has kept on uncomplainingly, always considering her husband's and children's welfare before her own. She was taken with la-grippe on Saturday before her death, but was able to be around the house some, until Monday at 3 a. m. when she was taken with a violent chill, pneumonia and other complications setting in. In spite of the best medical skill and the care of loving friends, she passed away at 10.30 a. m. of the same day.

Mrs. Ricklefs Buried Monday

Died Last Friday At Age 77 Following Stroke In December

Services for Mrs. Henry J. Ricklefs were held Monday at the Evangelical and Reformed church. She died last Friday, March 5, at age 77, following an illness of over two months. She suffered a stroke on December 28 and was taken to the hospital. Friday morning she suffered another stroke, from which she did not rally.

Born Conradine A. Groneveld in Uphusen, Hanover, Germany, on December 25, 1865, she was baptized and confirmed in the Reformed church at her birthplace. Her mother died when she was six years old.

Early in 1891 she came to America in company with Henry J. Ricklefs, who had returned from America for a few months visit. On March 5, 1891, they were married by the Rev. C. Mardorf of the Wayne Lutheran church.

The family home was made in Wayne township for three years, and the next 41 years they lived on the farm in Lovell township, four and a half miles southwest of Monticello. Her husband died December 15, 1933. Shortly afterwards she moved to Langworthy where she had made her home since.

She is survived by six sons and five daughters: Herman of Langworthy, Henry of Anamosa, George, Carl and Clarence of Monticello, and Ernest of Coggon; Lizzie (Mrs. Gerd Poppe) and Kate (Mrs. Fred Poppe) of Langworthy; Meta (Mrs. Louis Zimmerman) of Fairview; Mabel (Mrs. Thomas Kula) of Anamosa, and Frieda (Mrs. Fred Cordes) of Delhi, and 21 grandchildren.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon at 1:30 in the Goettsch funeral home and at 2 o'clock in the Reformed church, with the Rev. A. H. Tensick in charge.

DEATH OF MRS. GEORGE MOORE.

Mary Olmstead Moore came into this life at Enfield, Conn., on Sept. 4th, 1830. When she was 7 years of age the family emigrated to the west and settled in what is now Fairview, Jones county, Iowa. Her father was the first school teacher in that neighborhood, giving the settlement that name. Within a short time after reaching Iowa the mother died and was the first to be buried in Wilcox cemetery. Soon after this her father returned to Connecticut with her and her only brother, T. L. Olmsted. Mrs. Moore

her father returning to the west during her residence in the place. She was won by Geo. Moore, to whom she was united in marriage on April 26, 1849, at the age of eighteen years. They came to Fairview, Iowa, in 1856, bringing their family of three children, who were born in Enfield. While residing upon their home farm nine other children were born to them, all of whom, except one daughter who died at the age of three years, Mrs. Moore has been permitted to see grow to manhood and womanhood and settled in their life's affairs. Mr. Moore died on Sept. 4, 1903, in this city, to which they had moved in 1891.

Early in life Mrs. Moore gave herself to Christ, uniting with the Methodist Episcopal church. She was one of the earliest members of the class in Fairview, remaining a member there until the transfer to the church in Anamosa. For some years she has been deprived of the privileges of public worship, but kept her religious life bright with her constant reading of His Word which she was reading through for the fifth time, having begun consecutive reading some years ago. She was at times a great sufferer, some times going deep into the valley of shadows, from which it was feared she would not return, but in mercy she was spared to her loved ones until early morning of Dec. 16, 1910, when she quietly went to sleep without a struggle in the arms of her youngest daughter, Mrs. Josie Alspaugh, with whom she resided. Her family was very dear to this good

mother. She talked of them often to those who visited her. She was anticipating visiting her sons in Kearney, Nebraska, in the spring, but instead these sons came to evidence their love for mother in tenderly bearing her to the quiet rest of the silent city. It is not often so many of so large a family are able to attend their mother in these solemn duties.

Those whom she leaves behind are Geo. L., of Anamosa, Mrs. Mary Quimby, of Marion, Iowa; Timothy P., of Martelle; Thomas W., of Thompsonville, Conn.; Demas U., of Kearney, Neb.; Mrs. Alice Armstrong, of Salem, S. Dak.; Mrs. Anna May Boxwell, of Martelle; John G. and Jesse S., of Kearney, Neb.; Mrs. Josie J. Alspaugh, of Anamosa; Clarence H., of Kearney, Neb. Anna Martha died in infancy.

The funeral services were held in the M. E. church Tuesday at 10:00, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Frank P. Shaffer, followed by interment in Wilcox cemetery. Appropriate floral decoration graced the casket.

The pall-bearers were six sons, Geo. L. Moore, of Anamosa, Thos. W., of Thompsonville, Conn., Demas U., John G., Jesse S. and Clarence H., of Kearney, Nebraska.

All the children were present except Timothy O. Moore, of Salem, S. D.

There are twenty-three grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. Of the grand children, G. L. has three; Mary Quimby, two; Timothy O., two; Thos. W., three; D. C., one; J. G. one; J. S., two; C. H., two; Alice J. Armstrong, Salem, S. D., six; Anna M. Boxwell, Martelle, one.

Of great grandchildren, Mrs. John Lusk, of Martelle, has four; Mrs. M. L. Boxwell, Martelle, three; Mrs. H. L. Cole, Turner's Falls, Mass., one.

Thomas Marshall of Scotch Grove township, another one of the 31st Iowa, soldiers answered the final summons on the 27 thult. He died of pneumonia after a week's illness. His lungs became impaired by disease in the army, for which he recieved a pension, and he therefore realized that he could not long survive when informed of the nature of the disease. Two days before death he sent for Rev. Hines who administered the sacrament of the Lord's supper, and prepared the soul of the sick man for the life everlasting. Mr. Marshall was 68 years, 2 months old at the time of his death. He was born

in Morgan county, West Virginia, and came west when a young man. At the commencement of the civil war he was living at Olin. He was stirred by the call of the President for volunteers, and enlisted, Aug. 9, 1862, at the formation of Co. G. 31st Iowa Vol. Inf. He served in the war more than three years, and was rated as a good soldier. He was married December 6th 1864, at Keokuk, while on a furlough, to Miss Sabra Ann Faver, who survives as his widow. Mr. Marshall was a good citizen, and will be missed by his neighbors and friends.

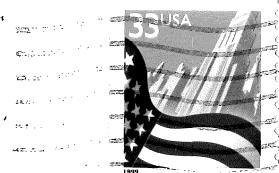
The death of Mr. Philander L. Vaughn removes another of the fast departing pioneers who for nearly half a century have called Wyoming "home". After long years of suffering with intervals of comparative good health his earthly career terminated on the morning of February 20th. He was a son of George and Huldah Polly (Eastman) Vaughn, and first opened his eyes to the light of day Sept. 27th, 1827, in Rodman, Jefferson county, N. Y. where he remained until he was five years of age and then with his parents removed to Lafayette, Medina county, Ohio. On the 16th of February, 1854, he was married to Miss Lydia Baldwin, and in 1857 moved to Iowa to the land out of which he made one of the best farms in this section of Jones county. Other farms were added to his possessions, but health failed and he removed to this village in November, 1892, seeking the rest and comfort he so much needed. He is survived by his wife, to whom he was

wedded fifty-one years, and by eleven children. With one exception these children are settled in homes of their own and all but one are residents of Iowa, not far from the parental home. Roldolf is in Anamosa, George in Colorado, Alvin in Clinton, Mrs. Florence Labcock in Odobolt, Mrs. Lucy Kirkpatrick near Clarence, Mrs. Susie Bonstol, Anamosa, Mrs. Stella Lindsey, Messrs. Edwin, Harry and Fred, Wyoming, and Mrs. Edna Francis in Davonport. On account of illness several are prevented from attending these sad services.

Mr. Vaughn was not a member of any church but he possessed many of the characteristics that should adorn Christian character. He was strictly honest his word was as good as his bond and in his intercourse with men he had a grand character for probity and uprightness.
