We have added some names of witnesses, where the marriage took place, ages, and parents names when available. Cost \$6.00 plus \$1.50 p&h, (Ia. res. add .24 tax). AFTER 15 Oct. 1986 it will be \$7.50 (Ia. res. .30 tax).

You may also send your donation to the photo-copier fund. We have \$47.35 toward a photo-copier. We need one badly as the cost of the newsletter has gone up considerably!

I have talked with and recieved letters from some members out of state or out of our area, saying if I lived closer, I'd love to help, but... Well your dues, research money, family group sheets, ancestor charts, help. You have alot of neat stories on your ancestors besides some great stories on your research, how about sharing them. We had a meeting with the township trustees last month to see about cleaning up some of the older cemeteries. We had trustees from Greenfield, Fairveiw, Wyoming, Wayne, Jackson, Washington and Cass townships were represented. We also had a very good write up in the ANAMOSA JOURNAL/EUREKA newspaper, bringing it to the attention of alot of people, the sad shape of the cemeteries. Some of our veterans are buried in these cemeteries and some will not be found as people have destoryed the cemetery. We are looking into the legal codes on what can be done to prevent this from happening again. The importance of our cemeteries doesn't give everyone the same history that we genealogists find. Sometimes we find in one cemetery the sad facts that our great-grandparent had more children but due to different diseases only our line survived. Also before records where kept, we now have a death date or a birthdate. These cemeteries ARE our HISTORY. We have got to save this part of our history or it will take away from our future!!

We will be taking applications for our pioneer certificates. If you would like to apply let us know and we will send the information to you.

SESQUICENTENNIAL for ANAMOSA has been set for JUNE 23,24,25,26, 1988. Our deadline for a family history on Anamosa ancestor is OCTOBER 31,1987. So we have a year to prepare an article. VICTORIAN GRAVESTONE SYMBOLS

The following is a synopsis of the talk given by Loren Dorton at our June meeting. Compiled by Renee Dooley

Grave stone or grave marker; the person buried in the ground
Tombstone;;the person entombed above ground

Three types of early stones;

1. Slate, limestone or sandstone
2. Marble
3. Granite

limestone and marble attract lichens

symbols on gravestones

I. Symbols of death;

- a. Death head (skull). From earlier times, skeleton with scythe or skull and crossbones
- b. Hourglass; sand at bottom, the persons time had run out
- c. Wings on hourglass; message of death
- d. Winged cherubs; symbol of the late 1700's
- e. coffin, pick and shovel
- f. Sea shell; the soul has left the body like the shells are empty
19th and 20th century; weeping willow and urns

19th century significance of hands, clasping pointing and etc.

- a. Frilly cuffs; church person, assuring the soul went to heaven
(benediction of church)
- b. Plain cuff; possibly signifying dead person
- c. Hand coming down is Gods one enveloping the other is Church
- d. Phoenix; symbolism of resurrection (mythological)
a bird that was long lived, Ashes of dead bird became new one
The Victorian era was the 19th century, approximately 1840's
Iron Crosses were placed on Czech and German Russian Graves

Anchors; early christian symbol, meant "steadfast in faith" or "Anchored safe in Heaven with God".

Angel: Messengers of God

- a. Flying down, bringing message of death
- b. Standing, comforting position
- c. Flying up, carrying the soul to Heaven
Angels are neutral gender

Arrow; not death by violence-- "You were so good in life, your soul sped with the swiftness of an arrow to heaven

People fenced in cemetery lots like yards, set off from neighbors, they were used as a picnic ground.

Tassels and draped stones,- good enough for parlor at home- good enough for gravestone, (furnished properly) very Victorian

bible; open or closed, on top or on front of stone; held open by thumb or forefingers. Will say "Holy Bible" if the words are not there it is not a Bible.

Book of Life; book not marked "Bible" open or closed. Usual open in the middle if more pages were to the left the person was old, if more pages were to right the person was young. If there was writing on the left page and not on the right, the book of life has been written,

Crown; Possible symbol of a lodge,
meaning eternal

crown with cross is Church symbol

Doves; person was gentle and peaseful, symbol of peace

a. flying down, bringing message of death

b. flying up. carrying soul

c. carrying rosebud, (with broken stem) child's grave

b. possibly the soul winging to heaven

Flags; Patriotism or military, more common on stones W W I and civil war
on females, son, husband or self in military. W W II and later, the
flag was placed near the stone instead of being carved on, and a real
flag was used.

Flowers;

Lily; purity


Lotus or morning glory; surely saved

Rose; most common of all symbols in 18th, 19th and 20th centuries; Beauty
love and paradise

Rosebud with broken stem; child

Bunch or 1 full bloom rose; Adult

2 full bloom and 1 broken stem rosebud; 2 parents and child


Wreath or garland (incomplete wreath ) person has lived a long fruitful
abundant life

Gates; gates of heaven, with steps to gate

Skyline-star-sun-moon; to heaven or skyward (heavenly city)

Moon; middle ages symbol of Virgin Mary (Catholic)

Sheafs of ripe wheat; person lived to a ripe old age, full maturity, ripe in
years, with a sickle, god harvested the wheat.

Lancet arch;  commonly known as Gothic Arch;

How to portray soul? made soul look like human

Tree Stumps or tree trunk; tree of life is cut down, life is over.

rings on stumps; years of life. Tree trunk with limbs cut off; possible
symbolized the number of children in the family

Harps; not common, mean joy

Leaves (common to victorian era)

Oak leaves; strength (in Faith)

Laurel leaf; victory

Ivy leaf; east to get along with

Palm; sacrifice and resurrection of Christ (fern supposed to be palm)

Full Grapes; Mature person

Broken column; life is over

Weeping willow; name indicates sorrow, regeneration from roots, planted
in low ground absorbs moisture.

Urn; symbol of death-in which remains are in
miner; lamp pick and shovel

If the stones are close and in a row, broken and reset, they are usually at
a site other than the original grave.

Chariot; Elisas Chariot- II Kings- Elisa rode a chariot of fire into heaven
Late 20th century; inset photos of deceased young adult;

Mourning picture-- Broken column, urn, weeping willow and kneeling person.
