AT ONSLOW: Last Saturday we received notice that E.M. FRANKS, living north of Wyoming, purposed holding a grand barbeque at the new town recently called after his name, but now bearing the cognomen of Onslow, from a former Governor of Maine. A general invitation was also extended to our citizens to be present but, although "the spirit was willing," the State Fair had made "the flesh weak", and only (con't next page)

some half dozen from Anamosa were in attendance.

A pleasant drive of two hours brought us to the new town of Onslow, where we arrived most thoroughly delighted with the country and--confoundedly hungry--. We were kindly greeted by Mr. FRANKS, and found a large crowd of neighbors with their families, and new arrivals constantly appearing.

While dinner was being got in readiness, we strolled about and picked up some items.

The first building erected in Onslow is that occupied by DILLRANCE & LYTTLE, dealers in Dry Goods, Groceries, &c---. This was last June. A blacksmith shop followed soon after, and then a scale-house for weighing grain, stock &c. The next building put up is a grain warehouse 20 X 60 feet, and rented to Mr. NOLAN formerly of Anamosa. An addition 20 X 65 feet is to be made immediately. A two story boarding house 24 X 36 is just being finished by SAMUEL CONLEY. In the second story will be a shoe shop. Several dwellings houses, besides the buildings already

referred to, are completed or under way. Most of the new structures were erected by Mr. FRANKS.

We also noticed stone on the ground for a new store 22 X 65 feet and two stories high, for C.M. SANBORN, who will stock up with Groceries, Boots and Shoes, Crockery, Agricultural Implements &c.-- This stone came from ANDREW HUTTON's quarry, two and a half miles NE of Onslow, and is of good quality. The new store will be finished in 30 days.

Another important improvement in contemplation is a steam flouring mill 30X65, to be operated by NARRAGAN & CHASE. The stone for the building is already on the ground.

STEPHENS & BATTLES will erect and have completed for occupation in 60 days, a store 22X60 south of the railroad tracks.

The Midland Co. are erecting a freight and passenger depot 76x24 feet, and a track and turning table will soon be completed.

Mr. FRANKS is about to build a large cattle or stock yard adjoining the track, and expects to have use of it too.

At 3 o'clock dinner was served. Huge quantities of roast beef, stuffed chickens and chickens not stuffed, potatoes, bread and butter, pies, cakes, hot tea and coffee. Estimated crowd to number one thousand people- were all fed during the afternoon, and we image that a goodly portion of Mr. FRANKS 2 roasted oxen was most comfortably stowed away before nightfall.

20 JUL 1871

The whereabouts of some of our OLD RESIDENTS. Last tuesday Mr. D. A. PEET and his family returned from a pleasant visit to Golden City, Colorado. Among other friends whom they met were, JUDGE MANN and his son, GEO. DOLLISON and his family, J. W. GRAHAM, (who has been married several months), and his brother-in-law, A. TOWNSEND, and family, Dr. N. G. SALES, JAMES HOLT. Of course Mr. PEET was pumped dry of Anamosa and Jones co. news in almost no time--which is saying a good deal. Trout fishing excursions into the mountains were among the most pleasant amusements of the visit. All our old friends are well and prospering.--Miss L. PEET, who accompanied the visitors to Golden City for her health, remained in that place and is improving rapidly. Golden City is about half as large as Anamosa, and is located on the Colorado Central R.R., 14 miles west of Denver.

Another improvement--The old dwelling on Main Street, built in 1855 by Mr. EASTERLY, and recently occupied by WM SWARTS, auctioneer, is being torn down to give place to a brick block 23 X 70 feet, soon to erected by C. L. NILES and WATERS BROS.

Efforts are being made by these gentlemen to purchase the lot adjoining on the east, corner of Main and Ford (con't next column)

Streets. It is proposed, also, that Ford Street be straightened, and the recent unslightly jog of 10 feet be cut from the east side of the corner lot with this purpose in view.

He is strong enough and hearty enough to pay the old lady a visit and is a good natured, lively old fellow with all.

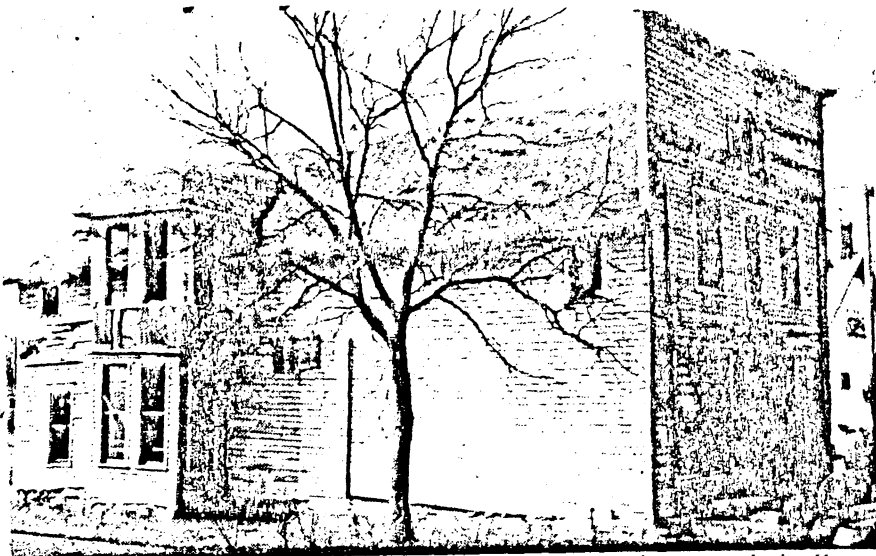

Mr. Thompson was employed by the Cedar Rapids School District and Kirkwood Community College until his retirement in 1974.

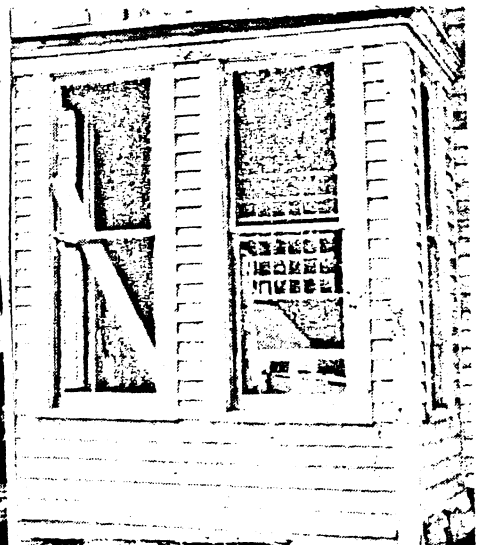

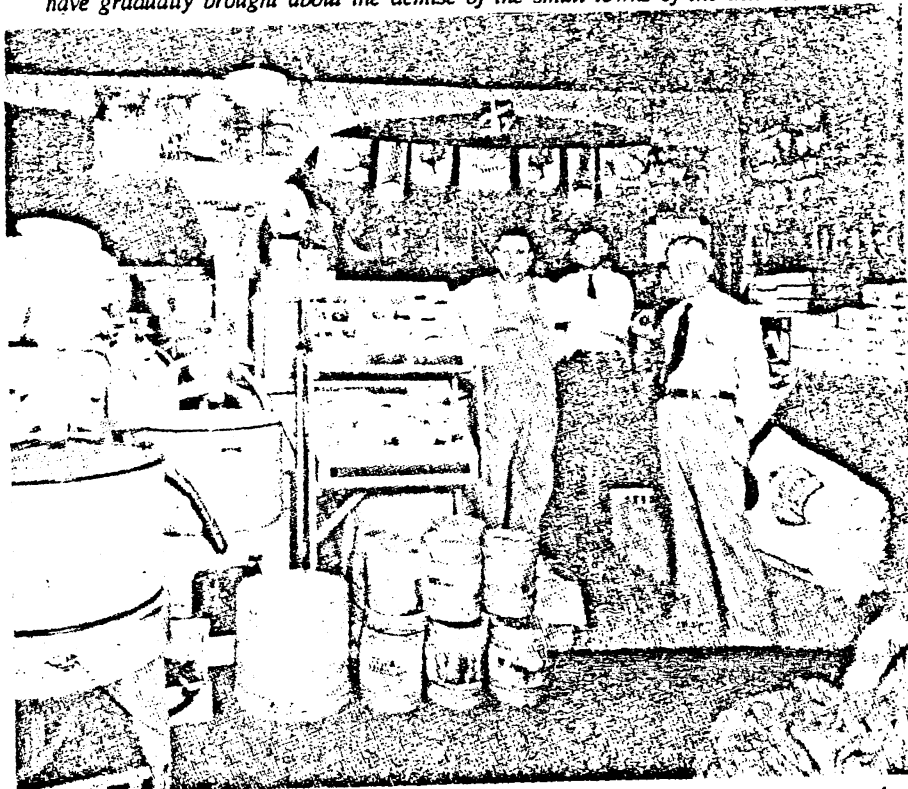
The Heyday, Decline & Fall of the Heyen General Store, Langworthy



Gracefully decrepit and wearing 135 years as well as can be expected, the Heyen General Store sits along the street that was old Hwy 151, silent witness change that have gradually brought about the demise of the small towns of the Midwest.



The old general store once had a post office as well. A rack of mailbox slots sits quietly prey to the termites and mice like the rest of the building.



Heyens store had 13 rooms and rented rooms to borders in the quarters up and behind the store, recalls Phyllis Husman, whose father and grandfather owned it. They purchased it from the original builder. The back 50 ft. was removed from the building in 1980.

We've all seen it standing there alongside Hwy 151, at Langworthy, maintaining an air of difficult, diffident elegance, while falling to pieces. And wondered about it. Even for those who have not passed by it often on, all these years, the decrepit building, clearly once, a fine piece of Victorian architecture, has both an air of mystery and an admirable unwillingness to give up the ghost.

We caught up with the daughter of the family which has owned the store throughout most of this century. Phyllis Husman, 63, of Langworthy, is the granddaughter of the man who owned and operated the store in its heyday, John Heyen. Heyen bought out his brother-in-law Henry Scheer. It is believed the store was built in 1858 sometime after the platting of the town of Langworthy. Having been built by Peter G. Bonewitz, the old general store is now 135 years old.

The high-style Victorian porch has long since fallen off, and the two buildings located to the east of it have been torn down. One of them, Phyllis Husman was the candling and egg sorting operations. Then, farmers brought them to the store in exchange for groceries.
